Program/Speaker:

Shannon Davis-Foust, President, Wild Ones Fox Valley Area Chapter, discussing "sowing wellness," the art of landscaping for water quality and community well-being.

- Shannon has a Ph.D in aquatic ecology from UW Milwaukee and has widespread interests in native and invasive species, habitat restoration and reconnecting people with nature. She presently teaches courses at UW-Oshkosh in biology and environmental studies.
- Native plants are important. They help birds, bees and all species stay connected.
- A couple of good books are: Noah's Garden by Sara Stein & Bring Nature Home by Douglas W. Tallamy
- Without native plants we lose native insects.
- The number of birds are down and they need a lot of caterpillars to feed their young.
- American garden is a life or death situation, healing the earth one yard at a time.
- Wildlife plantings create easier care, reduces water, fertilizer, chemicals, invasive species and creates wildlife corridor.
- Many native plants have large and deep root systems.
- Around 50% of the wetlands have been lost over the years.

- Rain barrels, rain gardens and native shoreline plants are important.
- Rain garden is an area of landscape planted with native plants and wildflowers. Size can vary.
- Basin is commonly 6" to 12" deep. Choose plants that can handle wet, dry and height.
- Pick at least 6 different species and they may vary by the type of soil and sun.
- Milkweed can be a good choice to add to a rain garden.
- Use sedges with native grasses.
- Rain barrels can be used in connection with rain gardens.
- Rain gardens can help prevent algae blooms.

- Monarch butterfly may be put on the endangered species list.
- www.prairienursery.com is a good website.
- Ground/site preparation is a key to success.
- Tilling is a good tool for ground/site preparation.
- Using cardboard on the ground can help prevent the weeds from coming.
- Lawn and grasses are hard to keep out of prairie or rain gardens.
- Leave leaves under plants and trees to help kill grasses.
- Leaves also help support winterizing for bees and other good insects.
- Creating a rain garden creates good family time spent together.
